Carnegie and Kate Greenaway Awards 2016

What is it about lies and good fiction? Three of this year's short-listed titles have lies in the title. One is already a prize winner: *The Lie Tree* by Frances Hardinge, one by a debut author: *Lies We Tell Ourselves* by Robin Talley; and one is by previous shortlisted author Nick Lake: *There Will Be Lies*.

Apart from this intriguing trio, there are previous shortlisted authors: Marcus Sedgwick with his enigmatic *Ghosts of Heaven*; Patrick Ness with a very original take on zombie literature *The Rest of Us Just Live Here*, and Sarah Crossan's *One*, a heart wrenching story about conjoined twins. Jenny Valentine is no stranger to winning awards: will *Fire Colour One* be the top favourite for Carnegie, or maybe it will be Kate Saunders' brilliant sequel to E. Nesbit's *Five Children and It: Five Children on the Western Front*?

If you and your shadowing group would like to join School Library Service for a morning of debate and fun, on Monday 20th June, the national awards announcement day, Wymondham High Academy is kindly hosting several groups, but could possibly accommodate more. If you're interested in coming along, please let us know.

We will also be looking at the Kate Greenaway nominations, which include several titles suitable for high schools, and offer a rich variety of styles and themes, every one totally different but equally enjoyable.

There is an added bonus this year. For the first time one each of the shortlisted titles will be awarded an Amnesty International Honour commendation, as a recognition of the importance fiction has in opening all our eyes to human rights, from birth onward through life.

A national service promoting well-being for young people launched on April 12th and is now available from libraries in Norfolk.

Shelf Help – Reading Well for Young People books have been chosen by young people and health experts to help with difficult feelings and experiences that can affect wellbeing.

The books have information and advice as well as personal stories about dealing with anxiety, depression or stress and experiences such as bullying.

Volunteers needed to help with the Big Friendly Read

Please promote the following to your students:

Are you aged between 13 – 25? Then Norfolk libraries need your help this summer.

We are looking for volunteers to help with our Big Friendly Read summer reading challenge that will take place at libraries across Norfolk. Volunteering sessions take place between the end of June and beginning of September, during the school holidays. We ask for a commitment of 2 hours per week although there can be scope to do more depending on the activities which are running at your library.

Young volunteers are vital to supporting the Summer Reading Challenge within libraries. In Norfolk libraries we work with young volunteers to ensure that children taking part are encouraged to keep their reading skills up during the holidays.



Challenge Champions volunteer alongside library staff to do the following:

- Register young readers for the challenge
- Talk to children about reading and what the challenge involves
- Help children to select books by sharing reading recommendations
- Work with staff to prepare activities
- Use creative skills to assist with craft activities and preparing displays

Reading Hack allows volunteers to use their strongest skills and vary the core Challenge Champion role. As a Reading Hack volunteer, young people can get involved with activities such as:

- Setting up a reading group for young people
- Producing content to share on social media such as book reviews, reading recommendations and reports on what is happening within their library
- Holding a regular storytelling session
- Helping with activities taking place within the library
